Portrait workshop

The Painters Progress group welcomed Vicky Sargent from Art for Wellbeing to their group for a session on portrait drawing.

Vicky began by revising the proportions of faces with us, which is interesting in itself. Check out your face in a mirror to see that your eyes are half way down your face!

We were then given 10 minutes to put this into practice copying a face.

The next exercise was to turn the picture upside down and then copy it. This was a challenge!

The purpose was to make us carefully observe each line and its relationship with all of the others, ignoring what our brain knows about the face.

Some of us found these drawings bore a closer resemblance than the ones drawn the right way up; others didn't. This illustrates the need to use our eyes very carefully alongside the facts we have learned.





Our final task was to use a grid. We drew a grid of 5 cm squares on the portrait we were going to copy to enable use to enlarge it accurately onto a grid of 7cm squares. Again we were to employ careful observation skills to draw each shape accurately in the same position on the grid



square but also remembering the facial proportions.

We then put this workshop into practice to copy a portrait of our own.

Writing Yourself - adventure into creative writing

The programme will consist of eight sessions during May and June 2019. The plan is that each session will be approximately 2 hours long and that each will be stimulating and fun!

The Aim of the Programme is to provide a safe space for those new, or not so new, to creative writing, to generate pieces of writing in the sessions. I will use different methods of inspiration to encourage the creative juices and we will use a gentle technique to critique and help each other to consider the work produced.

We will use a workshop approach to encourage writing and sharing - always asking the essential questions: what is my piece of writing trying to do and how does it do it?

Some of the technical areas we will cover include:

- The essentials of a good story what are these?
- Inspirations what can you use? what do you use?
- 1st person/3rd person whose voice?
- Dialogue how do your characters speak? How does speech move the story along? Do they sound authentic?
- The plot what keeps a reader turning the page?

What do you need to bring? It is an entirely personal choice. Some people (me included) can only write using a pen and notebook. Others use a laptop. Bring whatever makes you feel the most comfortable.

Food4Thought Group - Cheese

The topic for February's Food4Thought meeting was cheese, and we began with a cheese related quiz.

This was followed by some facts and information about cheese, where we learnt that there are more than 2000 varieties available worldwide and that cheese can be produced using a variety of milk including cow, buffalo, goat, horse, sheep and even camel.

The largest consumers of cheese worldwide are France and Greece and there is a cheese beginning with every

letter of the alphabet including Ulloa, Vacherin, Xynotyro and Zanetti Parmigiano Reggiano!

14 UK cheeses have protected name status eg Blue Stilton Cheese can only be made in Derbyshire, Nottinghamshire and Leicestershire, and both Cheshire and Wensleydale cheese are mentioned in the Domesday Book.

Until recently it was the much prized Pule cheese produced in Serbia



made from the milk of Zasavican donkeys that held the title as the most expensive cheese, but a farmer from The Netherlands, Erik Stegink, has gone one step further, and decided to milk his farm's pigs.

It took him around 40 hours of milking his free range pigs to produce just a few pounds of the cheese that, apparently, might not even taste good. Most cheese experts believe a pig's diet of slops, and meat if given the chance, mean that milk wouldn't hold good enough flavour for cheese.

This, however, hasn't stopped Stegink, who now plans to charge over \$1,600 for a pound of his *Piggy Palace* cheese. The cheese will be auctioned on the company's Facebook page and money raised donated to charity.

Apparently Stegnik says his creation has a chalky texture and tastes a little salty, but due to the huge number of man hours involved in production he probably won't be making anymore!

Having discovered many interesting facts about cheese, we then sampled a variety of different cheeses including the following:

Camembert one of the most famous cheese names in the world. Similar to Brie, this cheese's origins lie in Northern France. The cheese is named after the town of Camembert, situated in the Normandy region of France

Feta a famous Greek kind of cheese made from either sheep, or sheep and goat's milk. Unlike many other kinds of cheese, it is not named after the place where it first originated, and 'Feta' actually means 'slice' in English

Roquefort comes from sheep's milk and it is ripened in the caves of Roquefort-sur-Soulzon, Southern France. Reportedly, these caves contain a particular type of bacteria in their soil, which gives Roquefort (and other blue cheeses) some unique characteristics. This bacteria is known as Penicillium roqueforti

Wensleydale a famous British cheese that is originally from the village of Wensleydale in North Yorkshire, England

Fromage de Normandy full fat soft French cheese made with cow's milk

Dolcelatte Italian soft blue veined cheese

Ossau-Iraty made with pure sheep milk from the Basque region of France

These were accompanied by crackers and a selection of home-made chutneys including Autumn chutney, Apple & Ginger Beer chutney, Christmas chutney, Courgette chutney, and 2 different kinds of Tomato chutney.

- The usual season lasts from April to October.



MK U3A - Making Changes to your Personal Details


Open the MK U3A website (mku3a.org)

You now have two options – Returning to the Website or to Logout. Top right of screen. Select the appropriate icon.




Open Meeting - IT Help Desk

MK U3A - OPEN MEETINGS 2019

22 MAY – Anonymous Heroes – John Timmins

John Timmins' enquiring mind wanted to know what his father did during WWII – from the time that he enlisted in March 1941 until the time he was de-mobbed in July 1945 and arrived back to his native Canada. During his research John was to discover that his father had surreptitiously become one of the original members of a special band of brothers who were paramount to the success of Operation Overlord.

The author will be available to sign copies of his book after his talk.

26 JUNE - Dogs for Good - name of speaker to be confirmed

This month we will gain an insight into the fascinating work of the charity *Dogs for Good*.

These dogs are trained to help people with disabilities to make their life easier, including:

- Opening and closing doors
- Helping with dressing and undressing
- Retrieving items such as mobile telephones or dropped articles like keys or a bag
- Loading and emptying the washing machine
- Pressing a pedestrian crossing button

Reaching up to shop-counters with items such as a wallet

The exact structure of the talk will be confirmed once we know if there are dogs available to visit us.

24 JULY – Photography as Art - Karen Thurmanovich

Karen will explore how movements in the photographic world mirrored movements in the art world in general, especially starting in the 1920s. This will be followed by a discussion about photography as art and the role that photographic art plays in social change.

25 SEPTEMBER – The Amber Room – Mike Bartlett

Dubbed the 'Eighth Wonder of the World', the Amber Room was one of the great treasures of Russian culture, Russian history and Russian heritage – until Hitler decided he wanted it for himself – and stole it, stone by stone.

When, in late 1943, it was decided to dismantle the Amber Room and crate it away, it vanished, never to be found again ... or did it?



23 OCTOBER – James Gillray: First Ever Political Cartoonist - Ian Keable

Who doesn't love a spot of political satire? But did you know that James Gillray succeeded William Hogarth as the primary satirist of the 18th century, not only taking caricaturing to new heights but also refining the format of the cartoon to one that we are now familiar with? He is now generally accepted as the first, and the greatest, political cartoonist, still revered today by modern cartoonists.

27 NOVEMBER – Moments, Memories and Magic - Vic Bottrill

Do you forget other people's names? Find yourself in one part of the house and wonder why you are there. Put it down to age. Forget it. It happens to young and old alike – but not to everyone. Some mysteries of the brain are revealed. It's truly magic.
