25 Years, 200 Students and Counting ...

David Hyde has led the Milton Keynes U3A French group for 25 years, following a career teaching French at secondary level. He first became very interested in the language thanks to two very good teachers who taught him in the 6th form at school. At that stage he was especially interested in the literary texts.

As part of his degree studies he spent a term in Grenoble, known as the capital of the French Alps. During his working life he spent many holidays camping all over France with his family – he recommends this as a good was to meet similar French families, especially for children to meet. From his travels, he would choose as his favourite part the South, inland from the Côte d'Azur.



Reflecting on the differences between teaching in schools where language study is compulsory and teaching adults who study French as a leisure pursuit, David considers so long as people are interested, teaching French is a delight. However, he adds U3A groups are very good natured and, because there is no required syllabus, it is possible to lead the discussion in random directions. He estimates that over the years, with the churn of students, he has taught around 200 U3A students.

David is very supportive of the U3A concept that everyone has something to share: skills, experience, sports, etc. and that all contributions are valued and that the organisation is run on a purely voluntary basis. This has underpinned his long voluntary service to the French group which is highly valued and appreciated by us all. He has seen changes over the years, particularly the increase in administrative tasks, often as a result of changes in legislation. Of course, there are now more groups than in 1996, across a wide range of interests.

A member of some groups which have folded, David currently also belongs to the Spanish and Walking groups.

Even though born in South Bucks and having taught in Brackley, David knew nothing about Milton Keynes when he was appointed to a post in Ousedale school in Newport Pagnell.

David sees parallels between the U3A and Milton Keynes. He likes the concept of Milton Keynes – how a new town has been built in the middle of the country but preserving the original three towns, the range of opportunities, the cinema, the theatre, the libraries and the grid road system.

We look forward to the next 25 years.

The French Group

A talk from Peter Keegan on use of oil paints for Painters Progress group

As some group members have begun using water based oil paints we decided to invite Peter Keegan a local professional artist to talk to us about how to use oils in a landscape. The techniques used are also directly transferrable to acrylics.

Palette arranged warm on left cool on right, light tones at the top and dark at the bottom (for this painting) see photo.

He mixed in the centre of the palette. By painting tonally he was able to use one main colour, in this instance the brown that he mixed and added different colours at opposite sides thus creating a variety of related shades. He wiped his brush when adding a new colour but didn't completely clean it until he started mixing an entirely new tone. This helps cohesion

He uses hog bristle filbert **brushes** 10 and 6. **Solvents** - mineral spirit or zest it, paint medium which is 50% linseed oil and 50% turps.

Oil painting **paper** texture similar to canvas.

Plot by drawing the composition using thin colour and simplified shapes in proportion. Remove specs and squint to help simplification. Use darkest tone; alizarin, green and ultramarine (to make brown) in this instance. Hold brush like a wedge – scumble which is dry and scratchy.

Block by establishing tonal values for representational painting. Begin with darkest tones. Squinting is helpful in deciding tones (or black and white photo). No outlines or horizon line. The tonal value gives shape and depth. Blend alizarin and ochre with the original brown for a warmer brown and white on the other side of it for greys. Just wipe brush on rag for related colours. Don't overuse white as it makes the colours chalky.

Colour Build up layers, beginning with thin paint gradually getting thicker and dark to light. Thus the final layers will be lightest tones applied more thickly. Every stroke counts, one stroke at a time / \ not licking the canvas 88

Exercise restraint! Leave the highlights until the end.



We tried using these techniques to paint our own seascape. It is the first time we have all used the same source image, it was an interesting and useful experiment which invoked a discussion about composition and establishing a balance between sticking rigidly to theories or going with personal feelings.

Schoolreaders – Looking for volunteers to listen to children read in Milton Keynes

I work for the children's literacy charity Schoolreaders, which recruits local people to go into primary schools and listen to children read one-to-one on a weekly basis. This is a free service that we offer to

primary schools. We are partnered with several schools in Milton Keynes and now need volunteers to sign-up and become Schoolreaders.

Prior to the pandemic, 1 in 3 children were leaving primary school not able to read to the required standard. This is predicted to be 1 in 4 since the schools closed and children's education has been so disrupted. Many children are not read with at home, and the weekly intervention from a volunteer makes a huge difference.

I am hoping the Milton Keynes U3A may be able to help spread the word about the scheme to your members? I have attached a poster that can be used. If you would be able to send it out to your members or put it in any upcoming newsletter or Facebook group etc., we would be incredibly grateful.

Maps for Milton Keynes Walkers

Hello U3A walkers !

About 30 years ago I joined a small group who met on a regular basis for country walks in the Milton Keynes area, sometimes venturing farther afield to scenic and hilly areas in other parts of the country.

Over the years I built up and catalogued a large collection of printed walk descriptions for use on our excursions. Our advancing years (we are now well into our 80s) decree that our walking ambitions are unavoidably diminished and we no longer have a use for the huge archive of over 10,000 descriptions (kept in 21 folders) of walks in England, Scotland, Wales and some parts of Ireland.

The essential index to this collection is in the form of a searchable 1.4MB Excel spreadsheet listing individual walk numbers, counties, nearest towns, driving distance to starting points, National Grid reference numbers, walk features, difficulty rating, walk distance and duration. Driving distances to start points are given in miles from a Milton Keynes origin but can be changed to any other origin using an eight-figure National Grid reference.

I feel that this library and spreadsheet, which include descriptions published right up to March 2022, could be of use to active and enthusiastic walkers and would be happy to pass on the entire collection to anyone who could demonstrate that they could make the intended serious use of it rather than regarding it as a pile of wastepaper. The folders are inevitably rather heavy (weighing a total of about 45 kilos) and would have to be collected from Milton Keynes. Does any U3A rambler know of an individual or organisation who might be interested?
